A few years ago biologists discovered a tool that allowed them to intricately edit and re-write DNA. But where will CRISPR gene-editing technology take us in the future? How will it affect human evolution and the way our race develops? What sorts of moral and ethical issues are we facing with the application of technology? Are we witnessing the last generation of 'natural' born children? Will our grandchildren be edited not just to remove problematic cancer genes and defects, but also for height, eye color and intelligence?

In November 2018, a Chinese scientist, He Jiankui, announced

the birth of twin girls. He had used CRISPR to edit their DNA making them the first geneedited babies to be born. The internet exploded with criticism that he had violated common moral procedure.

Lawrence Draken's back-ground is in high energy physics, but she approaches this topic like a science reporter and writer. Draken published The Year of the Rabid Dragon, a mystery set in Beijing, China, in late 2018. The book explores some of the complicated questions Draken will be discussing in this talk. Join us for the presentation and stay afterwards for refreshments and reception.
