"Stealing" Cars in Lead & Other Great Memories

-Gary (as told to Joanne) Goodrich We lived at 122 1/2 Wall Street and my best friend Bob Carter lived on lower Addie. When I was in elementary school, we all went home for lunch, which was especially easy for me as I lived just across the street. (Does anyone else remember trying to get the fire escape stairs to come down absolutely forbidden by the principal and teachers.) Of course when I started junior high at the high school at the top of town it was a bit of a different story. I told my three daughters later that it was uphill in the snow both ways - not too far from the truth! I had band practice before classes which



meant I had to be there even earlier! Teachers were feared and rules were kept. Some of those same teachers taught my daughters, who were the third generation of my family to graduation from LHS - after my mother and aunt and me.

My best memories are of our class of 1953. Bob Carter was one of my best friends and if I didn't have a good idea, Bob could come up with one. We were getting tired of walking everywhere – what we needed most was WHEELS! My dad worked night shifts at the Ross shaft so Bob and I found his car, hopped in (everyone always left their keys in their cars) and had a nice evening cruising Lead. When we were done, we took the car back up to the parking lot thinking we'd be pretty slick and nobody would be the wiser to our adventure! Whoops – another car was parked in Dad's place. Well, no problem: we would just move that car to an empty spot and park Dad's car where he'd left it. The next morning Dad was telling Mom about helping a friend find his car. They had driven around for quite a while with lights on until they finally found the car! The miner thought he'd lost his mind! I used my best poker face while listening.

Neal Varland sold Bob and I his 1939 Chevy two door for \$90.00. We kept this little secret from our parents! We had wheels, but no insurance, no licenses (those didn't happen until the state mandate much later. Even very young out of town kids drove into school.) More importantly we had NO place to park without arousing questions. We drove it for about four months, then Bob skipped school and he and another friend went down to Sturgis. Being that this was our first car, we were pretty dumb and didn't know about car maintenance so we had never checked the oil. Bob drove the car back, got as far as the Sinking Gardens and blew a rod so he parked it on Main Street. After a few weeks, my Dad started wondering whose car that was. I wonder if he suspected and thought I'd confess, but I kept my mouth shut and so did Bob. We were never sure what happened to it, but assumed that maybe the police finally towed it away? Nobody ever found out that Bob and I owned it.

I guess I got what was coming for me because our three daughters seemed to have the same bug for wheels. One night Joanne and I were bowling at the alley in Pluma. When we finished we walked out and the hood of our car was warm and it was the only one in the lot with no snow on it! Another time one daughter called Joanne at work to ask if she could and her friend could use the car to go three miles to Grandma's house. Joanne warned her if the car wasn't there when I woke up to go to my night shift at Homestake Mining Company, I'd be furious. It wasn't there. When the car finally came back it showed they'd driven 75 miles (we always zeroed out the mileage when we gassed up). Kids never seem to be able to figure out the simple reason we were onto them was because we'd been doing all the same things a generation earlier!

When we graduated, some of us decided to drive to Rapid and join the military. We planned to go AIRBORNE. Bob and I walked into the recruiting office and every branch was gone to lunch EXCEPT the Marines. The recruiter got both of us. Later, another classmate Jerry Anderson joined the Marines too. We have a ton of memories of that time and the next several years. The best was meeting Joanne (originally from Wisconsin) on a blind date in West Covina, California in 1956. We were married nine weeks later (our picture is above) and are will be 65 years on St. Patrick's Day this year! We lived in Southern California until 1972 then moved our family to Lead.

The LHS Class of '53 met for lunch every month until this past summer due to COVID-19 and our age. The last few lunches, classmates came with children or grandchildren to drive them. We've had some rollicking reunions and have kept in touch by computer through the years. We have many good memories, stories and photos too.
