Shop Local Shop Lead! - This year's holiday shopping is going to be more intense than ever with shipping issues, shortages, and high demand. As always the LACC encourages you to shop local! Even this takes a bit of planning on all of our parts and here are some tips. 1) If you like it buy it, don't wait as it may not be on the store shelves later in the season. 2) If you are ordering from a local artisan, contact them NOW! It takes time to make these handcrafted items and they need to build their inventory.

3)Be creative. Instead of physical gifts, remember the gifts of experiences like shows at the Opera House, ice skating at Outlaw Square, a gift certificate to Lead's newest masseuse, renting a movie from the library, or just going out to dinner with someone. Happy Gifting!

Cut Your Own Christmas Tree - One of the best parts of living in the Black Hills National Forest is that we get to cut our own Christmas Trees. All the information you need to know is in this article! Christmas Tree Permits are available through December 31 to cut down your own ponderosa pine, spruce, or juniper tree for the holiday season. A permit is required for each tree you cut. Each permit costs \$10 and can be purchased online at Recreation.gov (plus processing/transaction fee), or through some private businesses. NOTE: A maximum of 5 permits may be purchased per household. The maximum allowable height of cut trees is 20 feet. Permits require that you cut the entire tree, leaving no more than six inches of stump, and that you cut unused branches so they lay flat on the ground. Trees should be placed in water as soon as possible to help keep needles fresh. Once indoors, trees should be placed away from stoves, heaters, or heating ducts. After Christmas, used trees should be disposed of properly as yard waste. Do not dump used trees on national forest land. Christmas Trees can now be purchased on Recreation.gov at: https://www.recreation.gov/tree-permits/



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

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTORS

Sierra Ward, Executive Director

With the decision to leave this job (a very tough one) has come a lot of conversations about work and work trends with Christine.

We've noticed that younger people (we're the oldest millennials) tend to not work jobs for life – in fact they tend to move every five or so years. We both looked back at our own lives and realized that it's definitely true of us too. Maybe it's because you've learned the job in that period and you're ready for the next challenge or chapter? Maybe because life changes naturally along those fault lines – you move, you marry, you raise families, you go back to school? Jobs can often change when these things change our lives.

Since I've started I've had people bemoan that the chamber can't seem to keep anybody. A brief history as far as I know: Melissa was a staple of Lead and the chamber director for over a decade! She started young and brought her youthful enthusiasm to the job. But goodness me, a decade is a crazy amount to work in this job! After her, a few other directors worked for about one-two years, having their own difficulties and leaving for various reasons. Then I started three years ago. I can kind of understand why people have had whiplash, but it's normal and average for a director to stay with a teensy non-profit for three – five years. This is a tough job and when you have a small staff (or are the only staff, as I was for a year) you have to do a ton of work to even keep things afloat, apart from the public or interactive parts of the job. Even when I started and saw the hurdles that must be crossed, I knew I'd probably last tops that long. If my life hadn't changed with the kid, I might have lasted on the higher side. But life happens and things change and shift.

This is not an easy job, which is part of its challenge and thrill – it's tough. I don't say that to complain, but rather because I hope that you can understand the difficulty of finding someone that will stay for life – it's unrealistic. Without the money to afford much support staff (or even a great wage) it means that this person does everything, from finances to marketing, from management to events with very little financial compensation. Sometimes it means cleaning the bathrooms, and sometimes running errands and also trying to keep everyone engaged and cared for. It's a lot. And all the while you're taking criticism and complaints that are older than time and have nothing to do with you or anything you did.

I feel lucky that I got to experience the many pleasures of working with the public (and there are so many high points to this job too!) I received so much support and so much encouragement for what we do and have done. I got to meet so many wonderful people and do something that truly feels meaningful! I helped people see Lead in a whole new way and inspired a lot of people to care.

We're set for a lot of transition and change in the next few months, not just in the Chamber but also within the Visitor Center and the town as a whole! In fact the 20's have proved to be a shake up decade that I think will only get more expansive and exciting for Lead! Change is hard in the best of times. What will the Chamber and Visitor Center do? What will they look like in a

year, in five, in twenty? I don't know the answers to these questions, but I know that Lead is scrappy and that somehow, someway it will come out in the end amazing! It's been through tougher times than reorganizations and restaffings and our chamber and our town will survive this one too.
